from an advocate

Roger, who has advocated for 13 children, believes that the stability and connection Advocates provide is what children in foster care need most. He sees his role at CASA as helping ensure children don't get lost in an overburdened system and that their individual and special needs are met. "The kids I see are traumatized...abused, neglected and abandoned. They will see multiple CPS workers, different judges, attorneys and foster parents. What they need most is a regular guy or gal by their side to just be there for them. Someone they know and can trust that is there just to look out after their best interest." Roger visited one of his CASA children, Michael, in a Residential Treatment Center in South Texas twice a month for 18 months. He was the only adult willing to go with him when Michael required oral surgery due to 17 cavities caused by lack of dental care. Roger fought 18 months to get him out of the treatment center and into a loving and permanent home. Without Roger's persistence, Michael would have languished in foster care until he "aged out" of the system at the age of 18.

what is CASA?

When a child enters the child welfare system in Collin County because his or her home is no longer safe, a judge appoints a CASA Volunteer Advocate as guardian ad litem, to advocate for the best interest of the child in court and other settings.

CASA volunteers are a diverse, passionate and committed group of people whose role is crucial in creating positive impact in the lives of children by helping move them out of foster care and into safe and happy homes. Our volunteers are often the only stable adult in the child's life and commit the time to get to know the children, ensuring they are safe and their needs are being met while in foster care. Judges rely on their unbiased testimony to help them make the best decision for the child.

the **need**

My best CASA story? "The day I stood in court and watched my CASA kiddos adopted into a loving family. After 18 months in care these two adorable children, who had suffered severe neglect were healthy and giggling with their new brother and sister. The oldest ran over to me and hugged my neck. He didn't let go for several minutes. He looked me in the eye and told me he loved me. I will never forget that moment when it became crystal clear why I choose to be a CASA."

Our Volunteers come from all walks of life but all share a passion for children. Volunteers must be 21 years or older and pass a background check. Our volunteers spend between 15-20 hours a month investigating every aspect of the child's life in order to provide the judge with a unbiased and well informed recommendation for a permanent and safe placement for the child. They attend eight to ten court hearings per year and visit with each child a minimum of two times a month. CASA Volunteers logged over 11,994 miles in 2016 traveling at their personal expense to visit the CASA children.

our child advocacy program

In 2016...

Less than **1%** of children served by CASA re-entered the child welfare system.

Collin County District Court Judges agreed with CASA's recommendations in **over 98% of cases**.

92 new volunteers completed 30 hours of training and were sworn in by a District Court Judge.

CASA served 100% of children in foster care in Collin County.

Since 1991 CASA has served over 10,000 children.

84% of funds raised were spent on program services.

We provided school supplies to over **225 children** and **350 children** received gifts during the holiday season.

Research shows that children **with a CASA** receive more services, move through the system more quickly, do better in school and are significantly less likely to re-enter the foster care system than a child **without a CASA**.


